WOW! Our 20th year of an organization at Holy Infant began on Sept. 1, 2016. It was in 1997 that a group met at Jo Lewis' to plan an organization that would include growth in holiness, service to the parish and the community, as well as friendship, sociability, and mutual enjoyment. That first meeting of 11 parishioners grew to 83 paid members at the close of 1998 and increased to 175 members as of May 2017.

Our officers for the year were President Dee Kaemmerer, Vice President Joan Wojciechowski, Secretary Nell Cox, and Treasurer John Nortman. The committee chairpersons along with the officers make up the HIS Board which meets each month to organize our monthly meetings. These meetings were informative, interesting and varied planned by our talented Joan Wojciechowski. In Oct. she presented "How Well Do You Know Your Pastor?" with Fr. Stanger as guest. Stacy Seipp, the wine manager at Schnucks, and her helpers presented Wine and Food Pairings in Nov. We were able to taste several wines along with different cheeses, and learned which ones to chill, how to store, and how to serve them. Another informative meeting was given by the Ballwin Police officers Mike Dohm and Steve Morrison. They gave many good tips about identity theft, caretaker crimes, Medicare fraud, travel safety, phone scams, credit card skimmers, and entertained us with stories as they answered our many questions. In Feb. Joan introduced Julie Hederman from the American Heart Association who gave us an enlightening presentation. Joan decorated the tables for Valentine's Day and we played a fun game "Cupids" Challenge". Along with the flowers of spring, April brought an interesting bee keeper, Bob Finck to HIS. He demonstrated 2 boxes of hives and talked about the many attributes of honey and beeswax, the problems facing honeybees today, and what mead is (which we all got a sample to taste). The afternoon found them at the History Museum where they had a special exhibit on Route 66. In June a bus trip to Fairmont Park for a smorgasbord lunch and horse racing was fun.
