St. Patrick's Day, also known as the Feast of Saint Patrick, is a religious and cultural holiday celebrated on March 17. It commemorates the traditional death date of Saint Patrick, who is the foremost patron saint of Ireland. Let's explore more about this special day:

Who was St. Patrick?

St. Patrick was born in Roman Britain in the late 4th century. At the age of 16, he was kidnapped and taken to Ireland as a slave. He later escaped but returned around 432 CE to convert the Irish to Christianity. By the time of his death on March 17, 461, he had established monasteries, churches, and schools in Ireland. Many legends surround St. Patrick, including the belief that he drove snakes out of Ireland and used the shamrock to explain the concept of the Holy Trinity.

How did St. Patrick's Day evolve?

Initially, St. Patrick's Day was a religious observance with religious services and feasts in Ireland. However, imigrants, especially those to the United States, transformed it into a largely secular holiday of revelry and celebration of all things Irish.

Cities with large Irish immigrant populations, like Boston and New York City, held elaborate parades to celebrate the day.

Chicago even colors its river green to mark the occasion.

Remember, while some of these practices were eventually adopted by the Irish themselves, they did so largely for the benefit of tourists. So, whether you're Irish or not, enjoy the festivities and celebrate St. Patrick's Day!



Recípe of the Month – Crescent Carmel Swírl By: María Dorn

This is a family favorite from my Easter Brunch

Ingredients

stick butter (do not use margarine)
 2 cup chopped nuts
 4 cup brown sugar
 Tbsp water
 (8oz) cans of refrigerated crescent rolls

Directions:

- 1. Heat oven to 350
- Melt 2 Tbsp. of butter and coat the sides and bottom of bundt cake pan with melted butter. (I also use non-stick spray)
- 3. Sprinkle 3 Tbsp. of chopped nuts in the pan

- Melt remaining butter in a saucepan and add the brown sugar, remaining nuts, and water to the pan. Heat to boiling, stirring occasionally. Boil one minute stirring constantly.
- 5. Remove dough from cans. DO NOT unroll. Cut each long roll into 8 slices.
- 6. Arrange 8 slices cut side down in the nut lined pan. Offset each layer of pinwheels slightly.
- Spoon ½ the brown sugar mixture over dough. Place 8 remaining pinwheels alternating over bottom layer. Spoon remaining brown sugar mixture over slices.
- 8. Bake 23-33 minutes or until deep golden brown. Cool for 3 minutes. Turn upside down onto the serving platter. Serve warm.
